SAINT IN THE MAKING...

THE EUCHARISTIC LIFE OF A SAINT IN THE MAKING



We've all heard of Bl. Carlo Acutis. But how about Ajna George? She may well be a future saint from India and has already gained quite a following.

WHO IS SHE?

Ajna was from Kochi in Kerala and was an active member of the church. An assistant professor, excellent student and member and coordinator of the Jesus Youth Movement, she was well-known in faith circles. But what really stood out was her devotion to Jesus in the Holy Eucharist and her fortitude in suffering mightily for the love of her Lord and the salvation of souls.

WHY IS SHE IN THE NEWS?

Ajna was only 27 when she left this world on January 21st this year, but the way in which she left is what has inspired many and caused people to take notice of her. Having contracted cancer in her mandible bone around four years prior to her demise, her intense love for Jesus made her brave the pain and go so far as to accept it willingly and call the suffering 'valuable'. When she was offered help by means of a vehicle to go to church to receive Holy Communion, which she never missed even a single day, she vehemently refused, asking instead to be allowed to walk so as to endure the pain for the love of Christ.

Her love for the Eucharist was so great that even during the lockdown and her final days in hospital, she demanded that she be given Holy Communion. Her spiritual director, Fr Jean Kattassery even braved interrogation by the police to visit her house to give her the Sacrament. During her last days, the cancer spread all over her face resulting in a loss of hearing and vision and even rendered her incapable of consuming the Eucharistic Lord. However, in order to fulfil her ardent desire, the Eucharist was given to her dissolved in water and fed through a tube. When in the hospital, she would only receive Jesus after spending an hour in adoration. Her hospital room had literally become a Chape!

Her final moments were filled with love. Receiving the Holy Viaticum, she prayed "Jesus, Mary, Joseph" for half an hour and gave up her spirit at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, following in the footsteps of her savior.

Ajna proves to us the power of the Eucharist and the undeniable fact that it is truly Jesus present with us physically. Let us learn to love the Lord the way she did and carry our Cross cheerfully.

PARISHES IN PORT BLAIR DIOCESE BENEFIT FROM FINANCIAL AID

When Communio India was initiated to share resources within the Church – following in the footsteps of the early Church – it was hoped that aid would reach even the remotest dioceses of the country. This is gradually growing into a reality, as the Church in Port Blair Diocese is willing to testify.

The Diocese of Port Blair (Andaman and Nicobar Islands) was extended financial support for:

Purchase of two motorbikes

- conveyance by public transport is always tedious because of shortage of vehicles in operation and the overcrowding
- Parish Priests have to travel long distances to reach sub-stations. Some sub-stations are situated 35 kms away from the Village Chapel (the Parish Church)
- · The motorbikes will ease pastoral work.

The roofing material for two village chapels in the diocese.

• The materials are yet to reach the designated places.

Support is requested in other ways:

- Financial aid for roofing sheets: The diocese has adopted a policy to provide roofing sheets to anyone who builds a semi-permanent or permanent structure. Roofing sheets are also required for Village Chapels.
- Help with pastoral programmes to run Small Christian Communities (SCC).
- Faith formation programmes for the children.

Saint of INDIA





Blessed Devashayam Pillai

Pope Francis will canonise Bl. Devasahayam Pillai on 15th May. Devasahayam is the first Indian Saint to be martyred on home soil and will be the first lay person from our country to be canonised.

His life took a dramatic turn when he met Eustachius de Lannoy, a Dutch Military Officer. When he narrated a series of sorrowful events that took place in his life, Lannoy comforted him and narrated the story of Job, a good man, who was tested by God to strengthen his faith. This encouraged Devasahayam and he was soon baptised.

Let's take a look at his life in brief:

- · Born on 23rd April, 1712 in Nattalam, Kingdom of Travancore
- Named Neelakanta, he took the name Devasahayam upon Baptism
 (Devasahayam is the equivalent of Lazarus which means 'God has helped')
- Worked as a palace official in King Marthanda Varma's treasury
- · Did not regard caste differences and mingled with everyone
- Angered by his actions, the upper caste accused him of the crime of betrayal
- · In prison, he spent each morning in contemplative prayer
- Fasted on Fridays and Saturdays in honour of the death of Jesus and the Sorrows of Mother Mary
- Many visited him in prison and his fame grew because of his holiness

When he was to be executed, the soldiers who tried to shoot him, could not, because their guns did not fire. Devasahayam took the guns, blessed them and gave them back to them, asking them to shoot if they wished. The soldiers did not show mercy and he was martyred.
